

## **Tuition Grant Scheme**

### for Singapore Permanent Residents (SPRs) and International Students (ISs)

The MOE Tuition Grant (TG) Scheme is open to students enrolled in full-time Diploma programmes in the polytechnics to help defray the cost of their tertiary education.

As an SPR or IS, you may apply for a TG upon successful enrolment into a polytechnic. This is provided you have not received TG previously to complete a course at the same or higher level of education. There is a limited number of TGs available for ISs, and these are awarded on a competitive basis based on merit.

If your application is successful, you will be awarded a Tier B TG (for SPR) or Tier C TG (for IS), and be required to secure employment and serve in a Singapore entity for three years upon graduation.

Unsuccessful applicants, or those who do not apply for TG, will need to pay full tuition fees.

### **How to apply for a Tuition Grant**

#### **Step 1**

Complete the [TG Option Form](#) and submit it to the Admissions Office

#### **Step 2**

Read the TG briefing slides that will be sent to your SP i-chat email on 19 April 2021.

#### **Step 3**

Submit an online application for TG at <https://tgonline.moe.gov.sg> from **23 to 30 April 2021**.

#### **Step 4**

Sign a TG agreement with two sureties (see below for important surety information)

### **Signing of Tuition Grant Agreement & Important Information on Sureties**

In view of the pandemic, the signing of Tuition Grant Agreement for AY2021 will be done digitally. More details will be sent to you via your SP i-chat email separately.

- a. You are required to provide two sureties to sign the TG Agreement.
- b. Your sureties may be of any nationality, be above 21 but below 65 years old and must not be undischarged bankrupts.
